OSCM Division Joint Junior Faculty and Doctoral Consortium

Organizers: Kai D. Förstl (German Graduate School of Management and Law) and John Macdonald (Colorado State University)

Focus: This PDW focuses on doctoral students presenting their dissertation ideas. A faculty panel will provide feedback on each proposal. Junior faculty will discuss how they are extending their dissertation research.

Incorporating Life Cycle Assessment in Management Teaching and Research

Organizer: Tonya Boone (William and Mary, Mason School of Business)

Focus: The goals of this PDW are to: 1) Provide an overview of life cycle assessment (LCA) and its applications, 2) Educate attendees on how to incorporate LCA into their curriculum, and 3) Discuss research opportunities associated with LCA.

Sustainability Research at the Strategy-Supply Chain Interface: Current Work and Future Agenda

Organizer: Veronica Haydee Villena (Pennsylvania State University)

Focus: This PDW aims to foster a vibrant discussion among strategy and supply chain researchers who share an interest in conducting sustainability research. Leading scholars will present their work and share thought-provoking ideas. Participants will discuss how to advance sustainable supply chain research.

Interventionist research: Challenges and Opportunities

Organizers: Aravind Chandrasekaran (Ohio State University), Suzanne De Treville (University of Lausanne), and Tyson Browning (Texas Christian University)

Focus: This PDW will conduct a deep dive on interventionist research, which often underlies both design science and the sciences of the artificial more generally. The objective of this PDW is to review how interventionist research departs from natural science, and how this departure needs to be managed in order to publish in academic journals. Examples of successful interventionist research will be considered. An expert panel will discuss their experiences with either conducting or taking to publication this type of research across a variety of topic areas.

Putting the 'Network' into Supply Network Research

Organizers: Jonathan Johnson (University of Arkansas), Mark Pagell (University College Dublin), Brian Fugate (University of Arkansas), and Barbara Flynn (Indiana University)

Focus: Supply chain management (SCM) researchers have only rarely employed network theory and analysis as the foundation for their research. In contrast, network theorists have only rarely applied their theoretical foundation and analytic techniques to SCM research questions. This PDW seeks to bring these perspectives together by combining the deep theoretical and analytical expertise of network theorists with important research questions raised by SCM researchers and the archival data sources that are now available, serving as a catalyst for critical supply network research.

To aid idea generation and networking, the PDW concludes with break-out roundtable discussions.

Scholarly Program Overview

This year's scholarly promises yet another inspiring AOM meeting. We would like to thank all OSCM members who submitted and reviewed papers and PDW proposals. On page 4 you can find our scholarly program highlights that also includes two Sunday café's: one about Emerging Sustainability Standards and the other about Women Academics in OSCM.



In particular we welcome you to the plenary session on Digital Innovation by David Simchi-Levi, Professor of Engineering Systems at MIT. The plenary will take place on Monday at 11:30 am in Westin Copley, Room: America North OSCM. We discuss three technology trends, digitization; analytics, including the application of machine learning and artificial intelligence algorithms; and automation, and their impacts on the ability of companies to reduce cost, increase revenue and improve margins and market share. We report results from live implementations in companies from a variety of industries including retail, CPG, automotive and airline.

David Simchi-Levi is considered one of the premier thought leaders in supply chain management and business analytics. His research focuses on developing and implementing robust and efficient techniques for operations management. He has published widely in professional journals on both practical and theoretical aspects of supply chain and revenue management. His Ph.D. students have accepted faculty positions in leading academic institutes including U. of California Berkeley, Carnegie Mellon U., Columbia U., Cornell U., Duke U., Georgia Tech, Harvard U., U. of Illinois Urbana-Champaign, U. of Michigan, Purdue U. and Virginia Tech.

He is the current Editor-in-Chief of Management Science, one of the two flagship journals of INFORMS. He served as the Editor-in-Chief for Operations Research (2006-2012), the other flagship journal of INFORMS and for Naval Research Logistics (2003-2005). He is an INFORMS Fellow, MSOM Distinguished Fellow and the recipient of the 2014 INFORMS Daniel H. Wagner Prize for Excellence in Operations Research Practice; 2014 INFORMS Revenue Management and Pricing Section Practice Award; 2009 INFORMS Revenue Management and Pricing Section Prize and Ford 2015 Engineering Excellence Award.

Professor Simchi-Levi has consulted and collaborated extensively with private and public organizations. He was the founder of LogicTools which provided software solutions and professional services for supply chain optimization. LogicTools became part of IBM in 2009. In 2012 he co-founded OPS Rules, an operations analytics consulting company. The company became part of Accenture in 2016.

In 2014, he co-founded Opalytics, a cloud analytics platform company focusing on operations and supply chain intelligence. The company became part of the Accenture Applied Intelligence in 2018.

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Listen to the Editors: An OSCM Podcast Series



Earlier this year, the OSCM division initiated a special podcast series entitled "Listen to the Editors." The host is luri Gavronski, Associate Professor for the Graduate Program in Business for the UNISINOS Jesuit University. He posts the interviews monthly in our division website. You can also subscribe to our podcast in *Apple Podcasts*, *Spotify*, or with the *Podcast Addict* app on Android. You can discuss any of the topics of the episodes using our Discussion platform on https://connect.aom.org.

Thank you very much for this initiative, luri! What made you decide to start this podcast series? "AoM asked us to make the new Connect@AOM platform more interactive. I believe in Social Exchange Theory, so we needed to have something to give back to the members willing to give their time to interact. So I suggested the podcast, where members could listen to journal editors and interact about the content."

During the interviews the editors reveal, among others, the trends they observe as well as how they view the reviewing process. What was the most surprising thing you learned during the past interviews? "I find it funny when I ask editors about their editorial process and they go "Our process is quite standard..." because every one of them describe a different process. In fact, this question was meant to warm up the conversation, but to my surprise, the editorial process is a source of differentiation among journals. In fact, as an afterthought, this is what we teach in our OM classes, right? Process is a source of competitive advantage..."

Podcasts allow people to listen at their own time, place and pace. What are good moments to listen to the editors? "I myself listen to the episodes with huge headphones and an audio editor software! [laughs] I can't tell how others should listen to our podcast. I normally listen to other podcasts during my commute. I moved to a place by the sea some years ago, so I have long commutes, during which I started listening podcasts. That's where I learned how powerful are they to convey information, the kind of long, comprehensive type we academics like. I have heard of some people that listen to podcasts while they do their dishes. I imagine how much dishes you have to accumulate! Well, our episodes are published monthly..."

Finally, how did the editors experience participating in the podcasts? "I have to admit that the first ones had to suffer a bit with my lack of experience. We had to learn everything from the beginning, from the interview platform to podcast publishing. Myself and the poor editors. Mark Pagell, from JSCM, for example, had to re-record the full interview because his audio was unusable, due to the poor quality of the recording. We have come a long way. The editors now have past episodes to listen to and know what to expect from the questions. We interview with a video platform, which makes the interaction easier than the audio-only one I was using in the beginning. I am getting good feedback from the editors in the end of the interviews. I believe they are enjoying the experience. You always reflect on your practices when you have to talk about them, right?"


In brief, the new platform provides us plenty opportunities to **share and discuss** knowledge via the Discussion platform and a centralized Event calendar and Library. **It is easy to sign on** with your AOM membership profile – no additional subscription is required!

At this point, our community has 786 members. It can be accessed via oscm.aom.org. We as webmasters have five simple steps you can make to get to know the new platform:

- 1. Update your member profile. Add a photo and tell us a little about your professional interest and background.
- 2. Start a conversation by posting a message in the OSCM Discussion group.
- 3. Visit the <u>Library</u> and share a document, video, job opening etcetera. Sample folders have been created in the Library already.
- 4. Create an Event, such as a call for papers.
- 5. Do you feel you are being spammed? Change your messaging frequency via the orange "Settings" button on the <u>Community home</u> (upper right corner) Your default is the Daily Digest of the OSCM Community, meaning you'll get only one email each day containing all of the previous day's posts. You may elect to change to real time, weekly digest or no emails at all. You can change your settings any time.
